Look at this view! I'm at the Eiffel Tower, 276 meters above Paris. From here, the streets look like lines on a map. In the distance, I can see the modern buildings at La Défense. Nearer to me, the buildings are older. That's the Arc de Triomphe. There's the Louvre Museum by the river. Down in the street, tiny cars and buses are driving along. Everything looks so small! Now I shake my head from side to side – and day becomes night! I can see the lights all across the city. It's beautiful!

Confused? Let me explain. I wasn't really in Paris! It was a "virtual" visit. I loved it. I want to visit again! This is how it works: you need a VR (virtual reality) headset. The best ones cost hundreds of dollars but you can get a cardboard VR headset for \$10! With the cardboard VR headsets, you just download a VR app and put your smartphone into the headset – and that's it! You can "go" anywhere: you can "walk" along Copacabana Beach in Rio, "surf" in Australia, and then "ride a motorcycle" around Las Vegas. And you can do all of that in one afternoon after school, without flying or driving anywhere. You can even watch VR pop videos. And once you buy the app and the headset, it's all free!

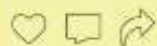

It was a Monday morning and I drove from Shanghai to Thames Town. I parked the car and walked around. Thames Town is less crowded than Shanghai and it's very peaceful during the week. It's a new city, but the houses look older than the tall modern buildings in Shanghai. It's attractive, but it doesn't look Chinese. In fact, it looks more like a traditional English city. That's because it's a "clone" of parts of cities like Bristol and Chester, in the U.K.

Bahidorá, Mexico

At Bahidorá, dance with 6,000 other people under palm trees next to a tropical river and listen to rock, hip-hop, and Latin fusion. It's in February, so it isn't only a music festival, but also a colorful carnival.

Venice Film Festival, Italy

The first film at the first festival in 1932 was an American horror movie: "Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde". The festival lasts for about ten days and is usually in early September. Every year, more than 50,000 people go, and there are more than 150 movies, including action, animated, science-fiction and comedies.

Glastonbury Festival, U.K.

At the first Glastonbury Festival in 1970, there were 1,500 people; now around 200,000 people go every year! You can hear all styles of music, from metal to jazz, but take a rain jacket. It's in June, but it often rains – a lot!

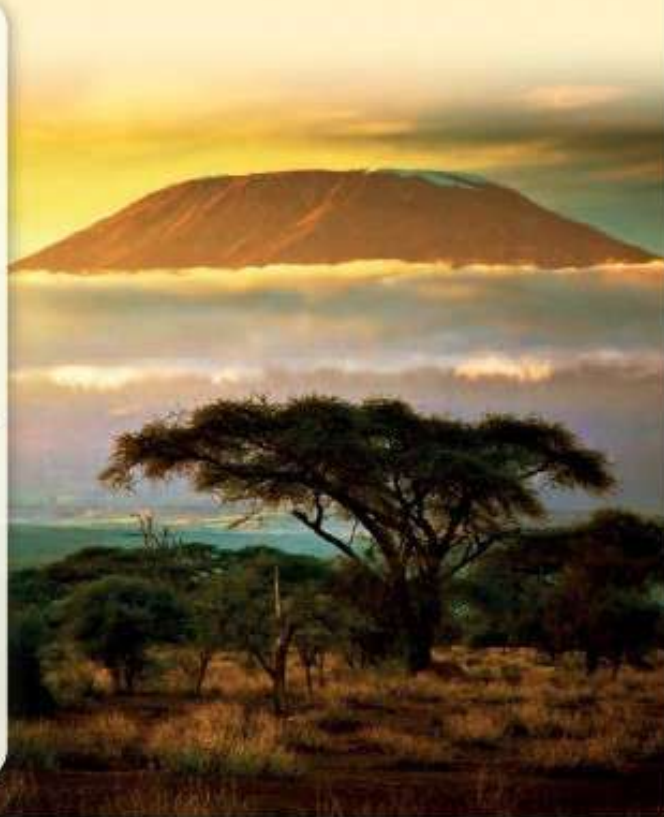

We can use **less + adjective + than** to express the opposite meaning to **more + adjective + than**.

Buses are **less comfortable than** trains.

(= Trains are **more comfortable than** buses.)

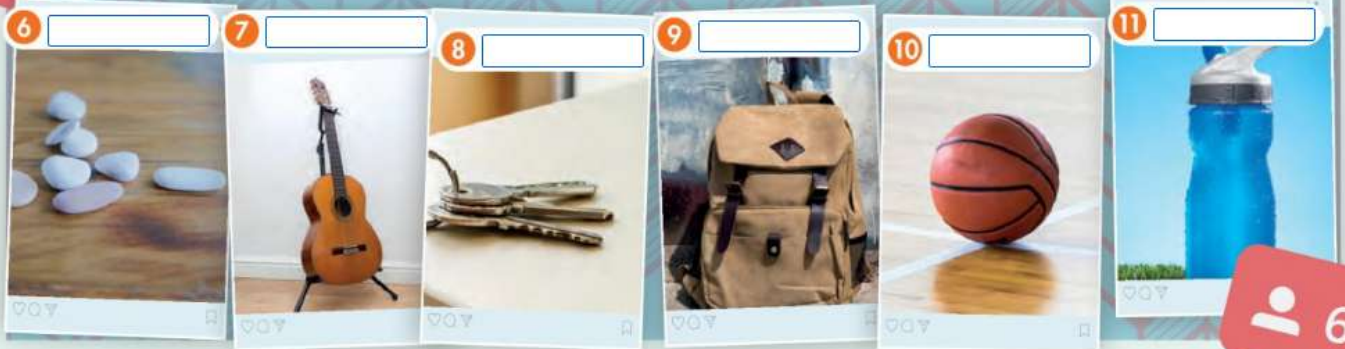

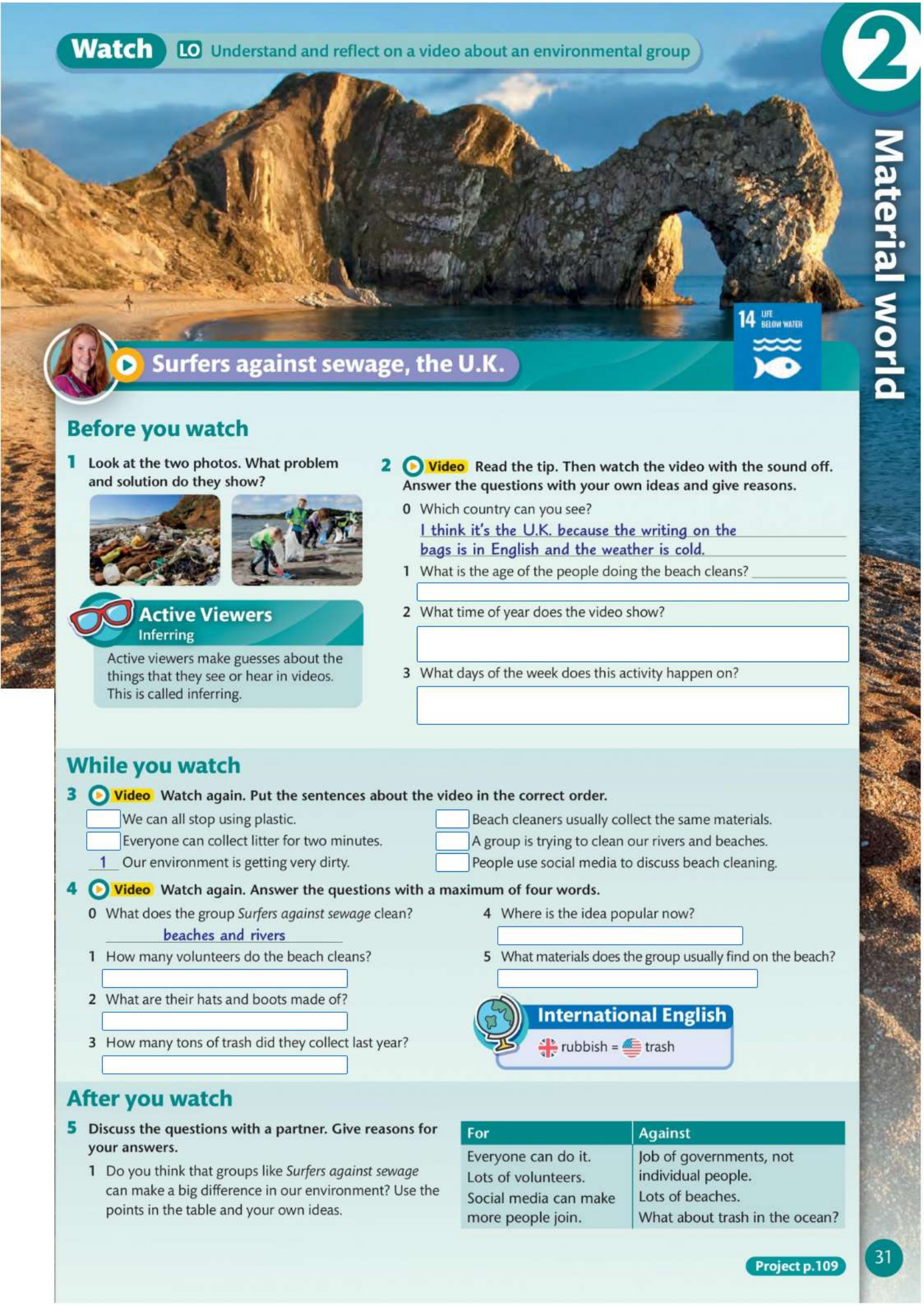

We use indefinite pronouns instead of nouns to talk about people, things, and places without saying exactly who or what they are.

We usually use indefinite pronouns with **some-** in affirmative sentences.

I'm going **somewhere** exciting this weekend.

We usually use indefinite pronouns with **any-** in questions.

Are you doing **anything** tomorrow?

We can form negative sentences in two ways:

- indefinite pronoun with **any-** + negative verb

There isn't **anyone** here.

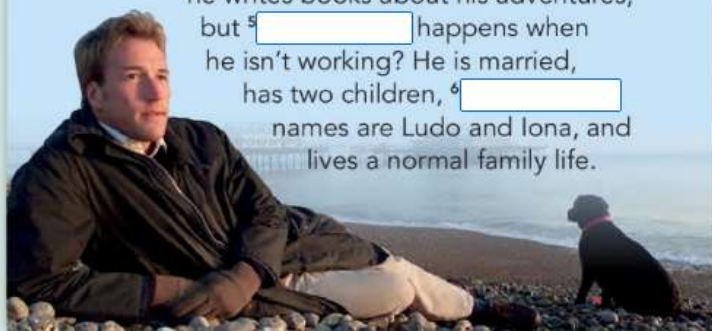
